Apply now – Make your mark on BSG activity!

A number of positions as Chairs of BSG Committees will become available following the conclusion of the Annual Conference in June 2018 and members are encouraged to apply. All of the roles are central to the delivery of BSG's core activity and strategic objectives with a very active impact on colleagues and the specialty. All roles ultimately include a period as a member of the BSG Executive Committee and Council in addition to their specific remits.

At this time applications are open for the following roles:

- Secretary – Clinical Services and Standards Committee (CSSC)

An initial two year appointment, the Secretary of CSSC will go on to become Deputy Chair and then Chair as part of a six year total commitment. The Secretary is a key member of the committee and will be closely involved in the BSG's key activities for a number of years. The CSSC Chair is a member of the BSG's key committees (Executive, Council and Four Nations). The Secretary role is principally associated with managing the process for BSG guidelines, guidance and position statements and as part of the role is the Guidelines Editor of Gut. The Secretary will also support the Chair and Deputy Chair, deputising as required. The post holder will also chair the BSG's Independent Practice Committee. This is a vital role in a key committee of the BSG that has a material impact on clinical practice in the UK and is central to BSG strategy. The successful applicant will succeed Dr Andy Douds.

- Chair – Education Committee

The role is a three year commitment chairing the committee and having responsibility for the Society's education strategy for members (across all membership categories) and ensuring that the quality of BSG endorsed events is maintained. As Education Chair the successful applicant will also be a member of the BSG's key committees (Executive and Council) with responsibility for leading activity with the BSG Secretariat and updating these Committees and the membership on a regular basis. This is a vital role in a key committee of the BSG that is central to BSG strategy and impacts directly on the quality of CPD courses in the specialty in the UK. The successful applicant will succeed Dr Jess Williams.

- Deputy Chair – Training Committee

This role is to support, and deputise for, the Chair of the BSG Training Committee. The Chair has responsibility for running committee meetings, setting the agenda and ensuring that Training Programme Directors are fully briefed on developments in training as well as receiving and representing their views to other training bodies and the BSG. These latter areas as the Chair require attendance at frequent meetings (Executive and Council) during the year and constitute a three year commitment. As Deputy Chair the successful applicant will attend meetings of the Training Committee, SAC and represent training perspectives on the BSG Education Committee. The successful applicant will succeed Dr Bev Oates who rotates from Deputy Chair to Chair of the Committee.

Survey: Physicians' management of IBD patients traveling

With improved therapy, patients with inflammatory bowel disease (IBD) often embark upon overseas travel. Pre-travel risk management for infections, venous thromboembolism (VTE) and potential for flares might be appropriate. However, there is little data regarding these recommendations and heterogeneity in recommendations is likely related to different levels of immunosuppression, duration of flight and travel origin.

Therefore, the IBD Sydney, which is led by Prof. Rupert Leong, are conducting a survey to study how IBD physicians worldwide offer travel advice before their IBD patients go traveling. This survey takes 5-8 minutes to complete and your responses are completely anonymous.

Minimising Mortality from Alcoholic Hepatitis

The MRC Stratified Medicine application entitled 'Minimising Mortality from Alcoholic Hepatitis' will commence in April 2018 and will last for 5 years. The award was for £5M and will involve Imperial College (Mark Thursz, Harry Antonaides, Elaine Holmes), University of Birmingham (David Adams, Trish Lalor, Chris Weston), University College London (William Rosenberg), MRC Biostatistics Unit Cambridge (Paul Newcombe), University of Edinburgh (Stuart Forbes) and University of Plymouth (Ashwin Dhanda) as well as the 40 clinical sites recruiting patients.

The programme will include clinical trials and an observational cohort study:

1. IL-1 Signal Inhibition for Alcoholic Hepatitis (ISAIAH) trial. A randomised double blind placebo controlled trial in patients with severe alcoholic hepatitis evaluating the efficacy of Canakinumab (anti-IL-1 monoclonal). 54 patients
2. Multicentre cohort study in alcoholic hepatitis (MICAH): recruiting patients with mild, moderate and severe alcoholic hepatitis and controls with acute-on-chronic liver failure / acute decompensation as controls. The purpose is to:
 - o evaluate the predictive value of bacterial 16S-DNA (and fungal 18S-DNA) levels in blood for infection and to guide the use of prophylactic antibiotics.
 - o assess the diagnostic utility of taurocholate to distinguish alcoholic hepatitis from other causes of liver failure
 - o develop novel prognostic biomarkers (including ELF and procalcitonin)
 - o develop a new prognostic scoring system
 - o identify the negative regulators of regeneration using gene expression profiles in liver tissue
 - o provide samples to investigate mechanisms of immune paresis
 - o evaluate the BLISS assay for steroid resistance as a marker of treatment response/prognosis
3. Mechanism of Action of an FXR Agonist in AH (MAFIA) trial to assess the pharmacokinetics and efficacy of obeticholic acid in alcoholic hepatitis.

Gastroenterology proposals should be specific to ulcerative colitis (UC), with the primary objective of increasing understanding of the effect of inhibiting JAK-STAT pathways on specific clinical aspects.

£2.3m grant awarded for clinical trial on patients with liver cirrhosis and oesophageal varices

Clinical researchers at University of Birmingham, in collaboration with University of Edinburgh, University of Leeds and the Royal Liverpool Hospital to lead a NIHR (National Institute of Health Research) funded multicentre clinical trial to research CALIBRE – Carvedilol versus variceal band ligation in primary prevention of variceal bleeding in liver cirrhosis.

Dr Tripathi and Dr Ferguson from Birmingham, Professor Hayes from Edinburgh, Dr Rowe from Leeds, and Dr Richardson from Liverpool have been awarded a NIHR HTA grant worth £2.3 million to investigate the role of beta-blockers and variceal band ligation in the prevention of bleeding in patients with liver cirrhosis and gastro-oesophageal varices. The clinical trial will be coordinated through the Birmingham Clinical Trials Unit (BCTU) based at the University of Birmingham under the leadership of its director Professor Brocklehurst.

The Chief Investigator Dr Tripathi, a BSG Liver Section member, is a Consultant Hepatologist at University Hospitals Birmingham and an Honorary Reader for the University of Birmingham said: "CALIBRE has the potential to be the largest ever Phase III trial in the history of Hepatology in the UK. The trial is to be rolled out nationally and all hospitals with Gastroenterology/Hepatology services and a research infrastructure are eligible to participate. The results could lead a paradigm shift in the management of patients with liver cirrhosis and varices with major implications to the NHS."

CALIBRE is fully supported by the BSG-BASL Research Development Group, and this support has contributed to the successful grant application. Further details of CALIBRE will be available shortly from [a dedicated website](#).

Changes to the Specialty Certificate Examination

The Specialty Certificate in Gastroenterology will become the European Specialty Examination in Gastroenterology and Hepatology from 2018
Dr Geoff Smith, Lead Specialist and Exam Board Chair

The SCE, co-run by the Federation of Royal Colleges of Physicians and the BSG, is a compulsory part of the accreditation process for the Completion of Training in the UK. It is designed to test knowledge of the Curriculum, helping to ensure a safe standard of practice.

Over the last 4 years the BSG, the European Section and Board of Gastroenterology and Hepatology and Federation have worked to develop a joint exam and this is now mandated in the Netherlands and Switzerland as well as in the UK.

In October 2017 the GMC approved the change to a single exam, identical across the UK, Europe and the rest of the World, with the first sitting in April 2018. The style, content and curriculum upon which the exam is based will remain unchanged from that of the SCE and resulting qualification will also remain unchanged.

The exam will continue to a computer-based test hosted by Pearson Vue.

2018 examination

The key dates for the Specialty Certificate Examination in Gastroenterology will be:

- application period of 27th December 2017 – 31st March 2018
- examination date 18th April 2018

Fees

- The Fee will remain £665 for UK trainees

Receiving Your Journal(s)

The BMJ Publishing Group (BMJPG) manages production and distribution of Gut, Frontline Gastroenterology and BMJ Open Gastroenterology, NOT the BSG. The BMJPG uses a mailing list provided by the BSG to post copies of the printed journals to BSG members; this mailing list is not held or maintained by BMJPG.

The journals' publication schedule means that there is a period of 3–4 weeks between the time the BMJPG needs the mailing list and when the journals are posted; in addition, the journals are always distributed during the month before the cover date. As an example, the mailing list for the January issue of Gut is required towards the end of November, but dates change from issue to issue.

Please help the BSG to ensure you receive your copies to the correct address by logging into your Aptify account and keeping your contact details up to date, you will also need to mark your preferred address to receive your journals. You can e-mail the BSG office at membership@bsg.org.uk if you need a reminder of your USER ID and Password for the BSG's membership database. If you have updated your contact details and taken the BMJPG's schedule into account, then enquiries about delays or delivery failures should be directed to support@bmj.com.
