Message from the BSG President

As this new year dawns, I hope that you have all had a chance to have some time with family and friends over the holiday period, and some well-deserved "down time".

On behalf of the BSG, I wish to thank you all for your hard work and dedication to the NHS in these increasingly challenging times. We have a continued workforce crisis, and there is ever increasing demand for NHS services. The NHS in all four nations has failed to meet key targets in ED, cancer, and hospital treatments over the past 7 years – this is not just a post-pandemic problem, or just due to strikes. I never fail to be impressed, however, by the determination of our members to work hard to address and tackle these challenges despite legitimate concerns, and sometimes grievances. The NHS is 75 years old and should remain an institution of which we are rightly proud. I am also proud of the British Society of Gastroenterology, which I have the honour to lead, and which has been serving its members for 87 years. In that time, the BSG has provided a welcoming collaborative home for its members and has been instrumental in developing and delivering world-leading education, training, research, and guidance.

The BSG's leadership was most evident in recent years during the early stages of the pandemic when the organisation filled a void of clear advice and guidance at a time of real uncertainty, anxiety, and some genuine fear. This influence spread beyond just our members and helped cement the organisation as a leading source of knowledge and opinion to guide aspects of government policy. I have great admiration and thanks for my predecessors in leadership positions in the organisation during that period. The BSG remains at the forefront of addressing current challenges in the NHS – there are no easy solutions, but we can harness the huge enthusiasm and expertise we have at hand to find solutions or mitigations where possible, and to actively support our members where not. As our 90th year comes into sight, I am

excited by the BSG's Project 90, led by our President Elect Colin Rees, which includes ambitious plans to support our members across the spectrum of BSG activities, and I look forward to this coming to fruition during Colin's presidency later this year.

The bedrock of our organisation, and indeed our specialty, is our members. Gastroenterology, in my opinion, is the best medical specialty to be in and I remain enthused and excited by my work in my day job, despite the clear challenges we face. Gastroenterology has rightly been a popular specialty and entry into it is very competitive. We know however that we have work to do in addressing some ED&I issues, particularly around gender imbalance but we are working hard to make this an attractive specialty for all. We have a rigorous ED&I strategy with transparent data and outcomes. This will help us self-examine our flaws, and address them, but we also need to attract a truly diverse group of individuals into the specialty. For the first time in our history, in September 2022, we invited undergraduates to become BSG members having become involved in some of the activities of enthusiastic undergraduate gastroenterology societies at several medical schools. We now have over 100 undergraduate members who can now actively contribute to the society, and welcomed many of them supported by bursaries at last year's annual meeting. I look forward to them becoming an increasing active part of the Society over the coming years. At the Taster Weekend and Introduction Day in November, I was impressed by the energy and enthusiasm of a diverse group of young doctors who will make a great contribution to gastroenterology in the coming years.

Not all of the challenges we face are medical. The BSG has taken a world-leading stance on highlighting the effects of climate change on health, and in attempting to mitigate its effects through advocating and <u>practising environmental</u> <u>sustainability</u>. 2023 was the <u>hottest year on record</u> and the 1.5°C limit on increase of temperature above pre-industrial levels is in danger of being breached in the near future. The recent COP28 conference stated for the first time a call to "transition away from fossil fuels in energy systems, in a just, orderly and equitable manner, accelerating action in this critical decade, so as to achieve net zero by 2050." This provides some degree of optimism, though this may be more aspirational than realistic on a global scale.

Healthcare is a significant contributor to carbon emissions, and professional medical societies have their own contribution across their activities. The BSG is playing its small part, not just through advocacy, but with practical measures across its administration and conferences, and with practical advice for our members. We have previously published consensus guidelines on green endoscopy and have followed this up with a green endoscopy checklist, and are developing an E-Learning for Health module in collaboration with the Centre for Sustainable Healthcare. I am very grateful to our Sustainability Lead, Sandeep Siddhi, and to the BSG Climate Change and Sustainability Working Group for taking forward this important work. In addition, we will be taking a small but important step towards increased sustainability of our journals. The BSG co-owns the BMJ-published gastroenterology journals and, in collaboration with BMJ, have developed a high-quality digital

A MESSAGE FROM THE **ENDOSCOPY VICE PRESIDENT**

I write to share with you some of the activities of the endoscopy section of the BSG during 2023.

I am sure you would agree following the success of the BSG LIVE endoscopy contribution this year and feedback from our recent BSG Campus online event, the endoscopy section continues to develop innovative educational initiatives for our annual meeting programme. Watch out for our ambitious plans for BSG LIVE'24. This will involve an entirely new approach to our "live endoscopy" where we have sought to include high guality educational sessions with more inclusive content for our trainees and nursing colleagues.

A major component of our activity is our quality improvement programme pursuing an overall "appropriate endoscopy agenda". I am pleased to report that the ERCP has been approved for phase two funding by the BSG and we look forward to the implementation of defined interventions that will contribute to the overall NHS strategy of improving patient care and outcomes in ERCP.

A new and exciting development has been the upper GI quality improvement project and with a stakeholder meeting already held with broad representation between the BSG, JAG and NHS representatives from four nations, I am certain that the BSG Endoscopy section will continue to drive this agenda. We hope to define with our partners what exactly constitutes a high-guality upper GI endoscopy and more importantly, to review the indications for upper GI endoscopy such that we can be assured that the scarce NHS resources are being used appropriately and we avoid unnecessary endoscopy of low value, truly pursuing green endoscopy principles.

Finally, the second phase of the acute upper GI bleeding project including new innovations in delivery of our upper GI bleeding courses and educational materials, will be rolled out over the next few months, so please watch out for an update at the BSG.

I am pleased to report that our guidelines group continues to be productive, and I am sure you would agree that the recently published BSG sedation guidelines offer a template for best practice, but also a roadmap on how to engage with local sedation and anaesthetic committees to ensure

that where necessary, our patients can receive appropriate deep sedation. This will have implications for our everyday practice so I would encourage you to update yourself on this important output. We are eagerly awaiting the updated IBD surveillance guideline which is expected to be available in mid-to-late 2024 and will be of relevance to all those in luminal gastroenterology.

We continue to seek to support our trainees who have raised valid concerns about their ability to achieve certification in upper and lower GI endoscopy. We continue to advocate strongly that trainees should not have their training adversely affected by training other members of the clinical workforce, but nevertheless accepting that clinical endoscopists contribute to a valued and vital part of our workforce.

One of the most vigorous debates that we have engaged upon on your behalf in the past few months has been in discussions about what constitutes an appropriate "point on an endoscopy list". Whilst there are at times divergent views on priorities, this is critical to our patients who deserve high quality endoscopy to be carried out in a timely fashion. I hope to be able to report on further positive progress in this area in the New Year.

Finally, it is a real pleasure to see a much-revitalised BSG Endoscopy Clinical Research Group under the leadership of Manu Nayar. Research, particular in the field of endoscopy, is critical to our ability to synthesize new information and evidence that informs all of our clinical and guideline activities. A priority setting partnership process is underway and will report in summer 2024 at BSG LIVE'24.

BSG Endoscopy on your behalf continues to advocate for excellence in patient care and in our member's interests when we interact on a frequent basis with partners at JAG and the broader NHS and by working in partnership, I am encouraged that BSG Endoscopy remains in a position to influence clinical priorities and the broader gastroenterology delivery agenda.

I look forward to continuing the hard work of the committee and meeting you at BSG LIVE'24.

BSG GUIDELINES UPDATE

BSG LIVE'23 in Liverpool was a hugely successful conference, and there was a packed hall for the CSSC Guidelines symposium.

The focus last year was on Endoscopy and Hepatology, with 4 important guidelines presented:

- Endoscopy Consent Update
- Sedation during GI Endoscopy
- Diagnosis and Treatment of Hepatocellular Carcinoma (HCC) in Adults
- Risk assessment of patients with cirrhosis prior to elective non-hepatic surgery

Guidelines/Guidance published in Gut this year:

- Guidelines for the Diagnosis and Management of Cholangiocarcinoma
- Guidelines on Sedation in Gastrointestinal Endoscopy

Guidelines/Guidance published in Frontline

Gastroenterology this year:

Guidelines are a hugely important part of the BSG's service to the speciality, and its members. The development of each guideline involves a tremendous amount of work by the GDGs. As some feedback on the value of their work, the table below shows citation and download metrics from *Gut* and *Frontline Gastroenterology* for guidelines/ guidance published in 2019 – 2022.

Finally, we plan to appoint a Deputy Guidelines Lead to commence in June 2024.

BSG IBD COMMITTEE REPORT

A busy year for the IBD section comes to an end, where we delivered a very successful educational agenda. The monothematic day in Liverpool focusing on improving quality of care and novel service delivery models was well attended despite a national rail strike and received excellent feedback.

For BSG LIVE'23, we delivered 7 symposia, most of which were extremely well attended with great feedback. We covered core BSG priorities including EDI and sustainability in our main symposia. Our joint symposium on liver disease and IBD provided key insights in this tricky field. The most up to date management of acute severe colitis highlighted the well-known evidencebased guidance and discussed hot new topics that may revolutionise future care. Our BSG Campus 2023 programme was highly interactive with great MDT style discussion of complex cases.

The updated IBD main guidelines are progressing well and are really taking shape now. We had a very successful face-to-face voting meeting and voted on GRADE statements with rock solid methodology. The guidelines are on track with a planned completion date of Q4 2024 and publication in 2025. Watch this space. A joint guideline development group for IBD surveillance colonoscopies has been established under the auspices of the endoscopy committee and the work has now commenced.

The BSG involvement as a society and by individual members has been key to the successful role out of the 2022 IBD patient survey and service self-assessment with over 15,000 responses. We are looking forward to seeing the results early in 2024. The BSG IBD KPIs have been agreed and published. In a fast-changing

There is a great demand for future IBD clinicians and leaders. We are exploring ways to promote IBD as a specialty as despite the increasing demand, fewer trainees chose IBD compared to other subspecialties. We plan to develop webinars, outreach to trainee events, and highlight career opportunities. The

BSG endorsement of <u>IBD fellowships</u> has been very popular and we are aiming to promote these posts to allow for additional training. We are also planning to develop more online content for trainees and IBD nurses.

As section chair, I have represented the BSG in the House of Lords enquiry to examine failing in home care services and have engaged with the other professional organisations to advance the matter. The House of Lords report has endorsed our critical views and <u>set out much needed steps to</u>

improve the homecare experience for patients and clinical teams.

The committee has worked with the Joint Committee on vaccinations and immunisations to gain access for IBD patients on immunosuppressive therapy for the Shingrix vaccine. This has now been offered to over 50-year-olds rather than just to those over 70s only. Finally, you will have heard about all the novel therapies entering the IBD arena. As a committee, we have submitted comments on all the NICE approvals for these novel IBD therapies.
